Kindergarten:

The kindergarten class has grown. We now have nine students!!

FATHER ANTHONY'S GUIDANCE

Attitude of Gratitude

An attitude of gratitude means making it a habit to express thankfulness and appreciation in all parts of your life, on a regular basis, for both the big and small things alike. As Howes puts it, "If you concentrate on what you have, you'll always have more. If you concentrate on what you don't have, you'll never have enough."

Here is a menu of tactics (just pick a few!) he endorses to help develop this mindset:

- Wake up every day and express to yourself what you are grateful for
- Tell whoever you are with at the end of the day the 3 things you are most grateful for
- Tell whoever you are with right now (significant other, friend, family member, etc.) the 3 things that you are most grateful for in this moment
- Start a gratitude journal Express gratitude in this journal every night by noting the things that you are grateful for, proud of, and excited about
- Acknowledge yourself for what you have done and accomplished in the last day/week/month/year. Instead of comparing yourself to others, give yourself credit for the big and small things you have been doing
- Acknowledge other people and thank them for inspiring/helping/supporting you often times people wait their whole lives to be acknowledged (and yet it happens far too infrequently)

If the gratitude process is hard to get started, begin by asking yourself, "What could I be grateful for?", and see if the ideas start to flow. This is a mindset habit that is recommended by Tony Robbins in his book, <u>Awaken the Giant Within.</u>

Gratitude is not only the greatest of the virtues, but the parent of all of the others – Cicero (106–43bc)

St. Thomas Aquinas, a brilliant scholar, is one of many patron saints of students.

- **St. Catherine of Alexandria** was famous for her debating skills and is a patron of students, teachers, and librarians.
- St. Joseph of Cupertino, famously a struggling student, is the patron of students taking exams.
- **St. Gregory the Great**, a patron of teachers, was a pope and writer who invented the calendar we use today as well as a form of church music that bears his name (Gregorian chant).
- St. John Baptist de la Salle worked to improve schools and is a patron of teachers.
- St. Gemma Galgani, a patron of students, is known for having been a conscientious student herself.
- St. Albert the Great was one of St. Thomas Aguinas' teachers and is the patron of science students.
- St. John Berchmans is a patron against gossip; he endeavored to say something nice about everyone.
- **St. Aloysius Gonzaga** was so wise that by the age of 11 he was teaching catechism to other children. He is the patron of young students.
- **St. Thèrése of Lisieux**, known for her "little way" of kindness toward others, struggled with social relationships in school and is an excellent patron for students.

Just an added note of the importance of the children coming to Mass regularly on weekends with their families. On weekdays they attend Mass during Faith Formation sessions, but the children need to pray with their moms and dads at Mass also on the weekends.
